Save Water, Save Life

Water is one of the most precious natural resources on Earth. Every living being — humans, animals, and plants — depends on water to survive. About 71% of the Earth's surface is covered with water, but only 3% of it is fresh water that can be used for drinking, farming, and daily needs. Most of this fresh water is locked in glaciers and ice caps, leaving less than 1% easily available for human use.

Over the years, water has been wasted and polluted carelessly. Rivers and lakes are filled with garbage, industrial waste, and chemicals, making the water unsafe for drinking. In many parts of the world, including India, people face water shortages during summer. Some villages get water only once every few days, and women have to walk long distances to collect it.

To solve this problem, we must learn to use water wisely. Turning off taps while brushing, fixing leaking pipes, using buckets instead of showers, and reusing water for cleaning are small steps that make a big difference. Farmers can use drip irrigation instead of flooding the fields, and industries should treat wastewater before releasing it.

Rainwater harvesting — collecting and storing rain for future use — is another effective way to conserve water. Schools, offices, and homes can install rainwater tanks to recharge groundwater. Governments and citizens must work together to protect every drop. After all, water is not just a resource — it is life itself.
