#### THE COLLEGE

Government Degree College Dhaneta is situated at village Dhaneta across SH at a distance of 500 metres from the town Dhaneta on Hamirpur Nadaun road, merely 23 km from district headquarter Hamirpur, the first most literate district of Himachal Pradesh. The sprawling campus is spread over an area of 1.74.98 hectares in sylvan surrounding that blesses it with an unmatched serenity. The legendry town Dhaneta has tremendous history and heritage with the glorious past of having sometime the Pandava.

Affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University Shimla, the college is imparting education to rural youth in different disciplines like Humanities and Commerce at under graduate level. The admission to B.A. and B.Com. First year of three year degree course under RUSA. is done as per HP University/HP government norms. With "Tamso Maa Joytirgyama" as its motto, the college has a team of highly qualified, dedicated and innovative teachers. In a short span of 8 years, the institution has excelled in the spheres of academics, culture, sports and co-curricular activities and has emerged as one of the leading institution of higher learning in Himachal Pradesh.
